 Luke 16:1-13

Monday Proverbs 3:27-34; Luke 8:16-18

Tuesday Proverbs 21:1-6, 10-13; Luke 8:19-21

Saints Andrew Kim Tae-gŏn, Priest, and Paul Chŏng Ha-sang, and Companions, Martyrs (Memorial) – “In the early 1800s, Christian communities began to flourish in Korea, under the leadership of laity. In 1836, missionaries from the Parish Foreign Mission Society secretly entered the country. The Christian communities encountered hostility. Over 10,000 Christians were killed. Among them were the layman Paul Chŏng Ha-sang and Andrew Kim Tae-gŏn.”

Wednesday Ephesians 4:1-7, 11-13; Matthew 9:9-13

Saint Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist (Feast) – “The apostle Matthew appears in the list of the twelve apostles in all three synoptic gospels, but only in Matthew's gospel is he identified as a tax collector (the other gospels call this man Levi). Matthew, the gospel author, invites his community of Jewish-Christians to embrace their Jewish tradition and participate in the Church's evangelizing mission to the Gentiles.”

Friday Ecclesiastes 3:1-11; Luke 9:18-22

Saint Pius of Pietrelcina, Priest (Memorial) – “Padre Pio was born as Francesco Forgione in the Italian village of Pietrelcina. He joined the Capuchin Friars and was ordained a priest. While praying before a cross, he received the stigmata—the bodily experience of the crucifixion wounds of Jesus. He founded a hospital, the House for the Relief of Suffering. He was a spiritual advisor, confessor, and intercessor, whose life was devoted to the Eucharist and prayer.”

My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Today, the 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time, we celebrate Catechetical Sunday, and we acknowledge and prayerfully support all who serve the Church as ministers of catechesis. In the spirit of the three-year Eucharistic Revival initiated by the American bishops last summer, this year's Catechetical Sunday theme, "This is my body given for you," (Luke 22:19) invites us to reflect on the Eucharist as the source and summit of our life in Christ.


Our Redeemer does not limit His salvific action on the Cross to a single moment in time. Rather, through the institution of the Eucharist, He makes it possible for us to experience His love intimately in an ongoing act of total self-giving. As St. Theresa of Calcutta observed, *"When you look at the Crucifix, you understand how much Jesus loved you then. When you look at the Sacred Host, you understand how much Jesus loves you now."* Two thousand years ago, Jesus demonstrated His love and mercy by offering His Body and Blood on the Cross for us. Today, He invites us to participate in this same redemptive act through intimate communion with Him, and with one another, in the Blessed Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist.

Catechesis that is orientated towards intimacy and communion with Jesus emphasizes the importance of the Eucharist in the life of the Christian. As the Directory for Catechesis reminds us, "[It is] in the sacraments, especially in the Eucharist, that Christ Jesus works in fullness for the transformation of human beings. Therefore, liturgy and catechesis are inseparable and nourish one another." (96)

Pope Francis challenges us to recognize that, *"If we truly wish to encounter Christ, we have to touch his body in the suffering bodies of the poor, as a response to the sacramental communion bestowed in the Eucharist."* Nourished by the Eucharist, we members of the Body of Christ are called to imitate this act of self-giving and to pour ourselves out for the good of others. We are invited, and challenged, by our participation in the Eucharist, to be missionary disciples proclaiming the Gospel through acts of mercy, justice and love. Inspired and strengthened by the Word of God, and the Holy Eucharist, those who are called to the ministry of catechesis generously give of themselves so that others may embrace fully the love of Jesus as it is expressed in the mission of the Church.

On this Catechetical Sunday, I wish to join with the clergy, religious and lay faithful of the Archdiocese of Newark in recognizing all who carry out catechetical ministries in our parishes and schools. I am deeply grateful for your dedication and perseverance, and I offer you my support and prayers. May God richly bless you for your witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ.

“New Year's Eve”

Ever since I was a little boy I've been in love with the month of September. September has always symbolized a new beginning, a fresh start, a second chance to heal whatever is broken in our lives. This excitement and sense of renewal probably goes back to the start of each new school year and all the enthusiasm that went with it. But for all the many, many years that I've been out of school, I've never lost my love for September and the chance to start fresh one more time.

As part of this annual rebirth each September, I always go through a sort of long New Year's Eve so to speak. It usually starts around mid-August. It is a time for reflection; a time to look deep within and ask myself if there are still any obstacles to God's unconditional love that I am refusing to let go of. As human beings, one of the biggest of these obstacles can be anger — anger that we might harbor for being hurt or abandoned by someone we loved and trusted very deeply.

Jesus says that when someone hurts us we must forgive. He tells us that the greatest gift we can give to another person and to ourselves is the gift of forgiveness. Forgiveness is the act of letting go of the past and accepting someone back into our heart; of extending our hand and allowing ourselves once more to be vulnerable to another. Jesus tells us that we must forgive unconditionally — that there can be no bounds, no strings, no limits to the amount of times we let someone back into our heart.

To genuinely forgive someone in the way that Jesus calls for, we must be willing to accept the reality that a person's faults and personality quirks will probably not disappear overnight. Jesus asks us to forgive even when the person who hurt us is not sorry; or even when we know that despite someone's sincere apology, they are likely to hurt us again. He asks us to look into the eyes of someone who has hurt us deeply and to show that someone love and acceptance instead of anger and rejection.

To forgive is a choice that God gives us. When we forgive, we choose life, and love and a relationship for ourselves and for others. We relieve ourselves of the burden of carrying around hurt, pain and anger. By so doing we are opening the door for true healing to occur; healing within ourselves; healing within another; and maybe even healing of a relationship. And we give someone else the freedom to live their life — or maybe to rest in peace — with the knowledge that they are loved without strings.

So, as we walk through these early days of September, this long New Year's Eve, let us ask God for the gift of forgiveness for any hurts we may have inflicted on others; and let us pray for the grace to forgive and to reach out to others to heal whatever remains broken in our lives.




BEREAVEMENT SUPPORT GROUP

Today is Catechetical Sunday. There will be a special blessing at the 10 AM Mass this weekend for all those who serve in our catechetical ministries. This Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each person plays, by virtue of Baptism, in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This Sunday is an opportunity for all of us to rededicate ourselves to this mission as a community of faith.

Why do we celebrate Catechetical Sunday?

In 1935, the Vatican published *On the Better Care and Promotion of Catechetical Education*, a document that asks every country to acknowledge the importance of the Church's teaching ministry and to honor those who serve the Christian community as catechists. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has designated the third Sunday in September as Catechetical Sunday.

The catechetical theme for this year is "**This is my body given for you.**" These words that we pray at Mass have the power to remind us of, to open our eyes to, the healing that Jesus offers us in the Eucharist.



Loving Father, we pray today for our catechists. We thank you for their gift of ministry in your Church. Grant them your wisdom that they may grow in the understanding and teaching of your Word. Grant them also your love that they may be fruitful heralds of your Word and lead others to love you. Pour forth your Holy Spirit upon them to grant them wisdom about what is important; knowledge of the truths of faith; understanding of their meaning; right judgment about how to apply them in life; courage to persevere even in the face of adversity; reverence before all that is sacred and holy; and that loving zeal which leads others to a transforming encounter with your Son. We pray this through Christ, our Lord. Amen.
